

Objective

By the end of this lesson, you will be able to understand and appreciate visual arts and the art of drama through engaging activities related to Kids on Stage and charades games.

Materials and Prep

- Paper and pencils
- A clear space for movement

Activities

- Activity 1: Charades Warm-up

Start by playing a round of charades with simple actions or objects. Take turns acting out and guessing what others are miming. This will get you warmed up for the drama activities later.

- Activity 2: Kids on Stage Improvisation

Choose a scene or scenario from Kids on Stage or create your own. Take turns acting out different characters and improvising dialogue. Use your imagination and have fun exploring different emotions and actions.

- Activity 3: Creating Visual Arts

Think about a favorite scene or character from Kids on Stage. Use your paper and pencils to draw a picture representing that scene or character. Be creative and add colors to make it vibrant and exciting.

Talking Points

- Visual Arts:
 - "Visual arts include drawing, painting, and other forms of art that you can see with your eyes."
 - "When creating visual arts, you can use different colors, shapes, and lines to express your ideas and feelings."
 - "Drawing a picture of a favorite scene or character from Kids on Stage allows you to use your imagination and bring the story to life in your own way."
- Drama and Charades:
 - "Drama is a form of art where people act out stories or scenes."
 - "Charades is a fun game where you act out something without using words, and others have to guess what you're trying to show."
 - "Playing charades helps us practice expressing ourselves without words and using our body language and facial expressions to communicate."
 - "Kids on Stage is a play designed specifically for children, and it's a great way to learn about different characters and how to act them out."
 - "When we improvise in drama, it means we make up the dialogue and actions as we go along. It allows us to be creative and think on our feet."
