

Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will have a better understanding of pirates from a humanities and social science perspective, including their historical context, societal impact, and cultural significance.

Materials and Prep

- Internet access
- Notebook or paper for taking notes
- Pencil or pen

No prior knowledge or preparation is required for this lesson.

Activities

1. Research and Create a Pirate Profile

Encourage the student to research a famous pirate of their choice. They can gather information on the pirate's background, notable achievements, and impact on history. Then, have them create a pirate profile using their findings, including a brief biography and an illustration or image of the pirate.

2. Map Out Pirate Routes

Talking Points
