

Objective

By the end of this lesson, the student will be able to understand and engage with the concept of Groundhog Day through various activities in Art, English, Math, Science, and Social Studies.

Materials and Prep

- Construction paper
- Crayons or markers
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- Groundhog Day book or online resources

Before starting the lesson, familiarize yourself with the story of Groundhog Day and gather any relevant resources.

Activities

- Create a Groundhog Day craft: Have the student draw and cut out a groundhog shape from construction paper. They can then decorate it with crayons or markers.
- Read a Groundhog Day story: Read a book about Groundhog Day to the student, discussing the traditions and significance of the day.
- Shadow tracing: On a sunny day, go outside with the student and trace their shadow using chalk. Explain how shadows change throughout the day and relate it to the groundhog's shadow prediction.

Talking Points

- "Let's read a book about Groundhog Day to learn more about why it is celebrated."
- "When the sun is shining, it makes shadows. We can trace our shadows using chalk."
- "The groundhog predicts the weather by looking at its shadow. We can make our own prediction too."
- "We can sing a fun song about Groundhog Day to celebrate the day."
